I really didn't notice any side effects from the generic but since switching to the name brand I have begun having hot flashes and night sweats (I'm WAY past menopause) and I feel anxious, moody, my foot is. In my case, if I took the brand when a generic is available my co-pay would go from about \$5 to \$50 - no matter what the drug was.
