Bleeding For the first 24 hours after the birth you need to watch your bleeding very carefully. You may feel contractions during the first few days as your uterus works to shrink down, especially as you nurse. Taking ibuprofen or other NSAIDs in the last few weeks of pregnancy has also been linked to a low level of amniotic fluid and high blood pressure in a newborn's lungs. There's also some concern that these medications may delay or prolong labor and, if used within a week of delivery, increase your risk of bleeding. If mg ibuprofen is not sufficient, you can add acetaminophen (Tylenol) mg taken 4 hours after each mg dose of ibuprofen, and take the ibuprofen every 8 hours. Pregnant women, however, should avoid taking ibuprofen and other over-the-counter medications without a doctor's. Ibuprofen is not safe to use during pregnancy, especially in 3rd trimester, as it may cause birth defects. Taking this drug in the third trimester can also cause delayed or prolonged labor by lowering amniotic fluid levels, causing the FDA to warn against the use of ibuprofen unless it is specifically approved by your doctor. It gets smaller each day after delivery, and by 10 days you won't be able to feel it. You may have uterine cramping after delivery, especially while breastfeeding or if you've had several children. Cramping lessens after the first few days. Your provider might prescribe ibuprofen or a stronger medicine, or both, to help with the. Ibuprofen can actually cause an important passageway in the baby's heart to close when taken in late pregnancy.
