Your doctor may have prescribed Marevan for another purpose. There are two brands of warfarin. They are called Marevan and Coumadin. Do not swap from one brand to the other. You should not combine these brands. There is no evidence that Marevan is addictive. Marevan is only available with a doctor's prescription. There are two brands of warfarin available in Australia - Coumadin and. Marevan. Coumadin and Marevan are similar but NOT the same. There is no guarantee that you will obtain the same effect if you swap between brands. Unless directed by your doctor, you should always keep taking the brand you were first. Dec 11, - The dose of warfarin will be different for different people. In New Zealand there are 2 different brands of warfarin tablets Marevan and Coumadin. Do not change brand without checking with your pharmacist or doctor first. Most people take the Marevan brand. Warfarin tablets come in different.
